

Project update

August/September 2021



Water Infrastructure NSW is reviewing infrastructure and non-infrastructure options from the draft Regional Water Strategy Lachlan Valley in finalising the business case for the Wyangala Dam Wall Raising project.

NSW Minister for Water, Property and Housing Melinda Pavey said consideration of options to drought-proof the Lachlan Valley is a requirement of planning for the Wyangala Dam Wall Raising project.

Minister Pavey said some of these measures could be a pipe network or greater use of groundwater. “It is a requirement of a final business case to look at other options that are available.”

“It is important that we have projects that stack up financially, are respectful of taxpayer dollars and deliver the best possible outcome for communities and businesses. We need to ensure regional NSW is more resilient and with more droughts expected and bigger storm events, providing water security means being able to store water when it is available.”

“For NSW Government major infrastructure project final business cases, there is a requirement to consider options with the purpose of confirming or update elements of earlier options analysis. This is normal practice to ensure Government projects provide value for money, are affordable and can be delivered.”

In the time since the dam’s strategic business case, the draft Lachlan Valley Regional Water Strategy has been developed. Throughout 2020, the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment sought community and stakeholder feedback on the draft Strategy including infrastructure and non-infrastructure options for improving water security and management in the Lachlan Valley.

“As part of finalising the Wyangala Dam Wall Raising project’s final business case, Water Infrastructure NSW is considering options from this draft Strategy” said Minister Pavey.

The Minister said when it comes to big infrastructure, it can take as long to plan design and arrange it as it does for the actual construction.

“We are committed to improving water security, drought resilience and flood attenuation for the Lachlan Valley.”

Project moves into new Government agency

The NSW Government recently established Water Infrastructure NSW, which sits within the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment. This agency is charged with delivering critical water infrastructure projects in NSW and providing a coordinated and unified infrastructure delivery approach across several NSW water agencies.

The Government has established similar infrastructure agencies in education and health, which have been operating successfully over several years.

On 1 July this year, the Wyangala Dam Wall Raising project transitioned to Water Infrastructure NSW. WaterNSW continues to work with the project team as the owner and operator of Wyangala Dam.

Inundation maps released

In June, the project team provided inundation maps for the proposed 10m Full Supply Level increase for the dam to landowners and van owners at Wyangala Waters and Grabine Lakeside holiday parks.

The project team is meeting with landowners who would like more information to discuss the inundation information provided to them.

In July, the project team held six community information webinars exclusively for Wyangala Waters and Grabine Lakeside holiday park van owners. These webinars were held to discuss and address holiday van owner questions about the recently released inundation impacts. Key themes raised include inundation, relocation, environmental and construction impacts, timing and work opportunities.

Community engagement

This quarter has continued to be busy and ongoing despite current COVID-19 restrictions, with the project team hosting:

- community webinars providing updates on the project
- local business webinars
- van owner information webinars
- stakeholder briefings
- impacted landowner meetings
- in-person community information sessions

Key themes raised during community and local business sessions included but were not limited to, project progress and development, flood and hydrology modelling, updated inundation mapping and impact on project timeframes, alternate water security solutions, water licenses, water sharing plans, and compliance with the Murray Darling Basin Plan along with local businesses and employment opportunities.

Wyangala Water Treatment Plant procurement gets underway

To deliver the new water treatment plant Enviroacific Services aims to source at least one-third of its workforce from the local community and engage more than 10 local businesses.

Key construction areas for local businesses include fabrication, electrical installation, civil engineering, civil and earthworks and geotechnical surveying

“With the construction of the water treatment plant due to start in late 2021, this month we are reaching out to local businesses for services.

Now is the time to sign up to the local business register if you are interested in getting involved. Local business procurement will happen on a rolling basis as key project milestones are reached and services are required.”


