Wilcannia Weir Replacement Project update

Public exhibition of the EIS

The Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) document for the proposed new Wilcannia weir is anticipated to go on Public Exhibition for community and stakeholders to provide their feedback in May 2022. The exhibition has been delayed from January 2022 to allow time to undertake additional engineering assessments and update the EIS based on community feedback.

In addition to outlining the proposed plan for the construction of the new weir, the EIS also outlines the findings from the environmental and cultural heritage assessments and the steps to be taken to avoid or reduce impacts during construction.

The EIS will be on display through the month of May 2022 at key locations in town. During the exhibition period, feedback can be submitted in writing, by sending an email submission, or by talking to one of our independent transcribers from the Department of Planning and Environment who will record what you want to say.

Your comments and suggestions on the EIS will be provided to the NSW and Australian Government agencies as part of their final review and assessment of the EIS.

A community session is scheduled for **Tuesday 5 April 2022** to address questions on the public exhibition and feedback process.

Stormwater mitigation work

The proposed new weir will be built 5 km downstream of the existing weir which means the existing raw water intake and the stormwater drain outlets will be located upstream and may discharge directly into the new weir pool.

To deliver the best possible outcome for the community, we are currently investigating solutions to reduce the impacts of the stormwater entering the weir pool. Engineering assessments are currently underway with the stormwater mitigation works planned for the end of 2022.

Union Bend roadwork underway in December 2021

Early roadworks undertaken by Central Darling Shire Council to support construction access to the new weir site began in December 2021. Unfortunately, this work has been interrupted by the wet start to 2022. This work is set to resume in March or April depending on river heights.
